Proposed by: Singapore

- 01) THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY,
- 02) *Aware* of the fact that the main countries that struggle with
- 03) human trafficking are the poor developing countries
- 04) encouraging other countries to be supportive of the action of the
- 05) United Nations,
- 06) *Fully believing* that human trafficking is a problem,
- 07) *Having considered* the possibility of creating laws directed at
- 08) human trafficking,
- 09) *Bearing in mind* that the places where the human slaves are
- 10) coming from are developing and third world nations so change
- 11) will not be quick,
- 12) 1. Recommends punishing people who not only sell but
- 13) the people who are buying these human slaves;
- 14) 2. Recognizing human trafficking as a crime against humanity,
- 15) the United Nations recommends that nations send arrested
- 16) human traffickers to trial in the International Criminal Court,
- 17) which will handle punishment as follows:
- 18) a) The ICC will determine the appropriate sentencing for
- 19) human traffickers, taking into account the severity of the
- 20) crime, including the size of the trade as well as whether
- 21) women and children are trafficked.
- 22) b) The ICC will determine what money and assets were
- 23) related to the human trafficking business, confiscate
- 24) those assets, and direct them toward the relief effort for
- 25) human trafficking victims.
- 26) c) The ICC courts will also encourage convicted human
- 27) traffickers to provide information regarding the trade by
- 28) providing incentives such as a reduced sentence.

- 29) 3. Encourages educating the public about human trafficking
30) particularly women and children in third world nations; this
31) initiative will be enabled by non-profit organizations such as
32) and UNIFEM;
- 33) 3. Further recommends harsh punishments and direct laws
34) made for helping the problem;
- 35) 4. Further recommends that more government jobs- like fixing
36) or building schools, libraries, bridges, etc. -be created so
37) that civilians will have a source of income and would not
38) have to resort human trafficking; which would be part of the
39) relief funds towards the prevention of trafficking;
- 40) 5. Requests temporary economic relief for nations whose
41) economy currently depends on human trafficking and would
42) suffer from economic downfall without it;
- 43) 6. Authorizes United Nations government to create
44) organizations like the ILO, ORACLE, UNICEF and to utilize
45) NGOs to stabilize destitute areas that have been impacted
46) by human trafficking by educating the population and
47) providing financial relief and support
48) - This will provide job opportunities to the victims and boost
49) the victims and boost the country' economy;
- 50) 7. Proposes a coalition of developed nations to contribute
51) the means and funds towards the enforcement of the
52) prevention of human trafficking. Other nations' involvement
53) would only be required if said nations are receiving aid.
