Subject: Expulsion of Humanitarian Aid Agencies from Darfur

Proposed by: Libya

01) THE SECURITY COUNCIL,

02) *Aware* of the changes in foreign policy that have resulted in
03) Sudan as a result of the United Nations International Criminal
04) Court's recent decision to issue an arrest warrant for
05) current Sudanese president Al-Bashir, on charges of war crimes
06) and crimes against humanity,

07) *Having heard* that thirteen international aid agencies have since
08) been expelled in retribution from Sudan by the government of
09) Khartoum, on charges of allegedly cooperating with the ICC,
10) which they have thus denied,

11) *Fully alarmed* that the absence of these widespread aid agencies
12) in the refugee camps and other conflict zones of Darfur will lead
13) to greatly increased shortages in food, water, medicine, and
14) other necessary aid that will put the lives of countless civilians
15) at risk,

16) *Keeping in mind* that United Nations peacekeeping forces do not
17) have nearly enough numbers, supplies, or funding to adequately
18) fill the need left by the departing of these agencies,

19) *Recalling that* much of the money flowing into Sudan, in
20) commerce and in international aid meant to help to refugees,
21) has been mishandled and spent in ways opposite to the
22) intentions of the benefactors,

23) *Realizing* that the steps taken by Khartoum thus far to aid their
24) displaced and terrorized civilian population have been minimal
25) at best, and stand little chance of expanding,

26) *Deploring* this senseless and selfish waste of the people of
27) Darfur's lives, and confident that these actions will only serve to
28) add to Al-Bashir's list of crimes against humanity, as the entire

- 29) civilian population of Darfur is now being held hostage in all but
30) open declaration,
- 31) *Believing* that the international community has a moral
32) obligation to act quickly to oppose these vengeful and
33) dangerous decisions made at the expense of Darfur's civilians,
- 34) 1. Trusts that the international community will make the safety
35) of Darfur's needy their first priority;
- 36) 2. Emphasizes the importance that countries engaged in
37) widespread trade and collaboration with Sudan play in
38) influencing their policy;
- 39) 3. Calls upon these countries to also restrict trade and use their
40) leverage to make it known to the government of Sudan that
41) they must allow their civilians lifesaving aid;
- 42) 4. Further requests that until the re-implementation of the
43) expelled aid agencies can be achieved, that the United
44) Nations, especially those member states contributing heavily
45) to its general funding, would divert their humanitarian aid
46) money and supplies to those aid agencies still operating in
47) Darfur, so that they can expand their scope and attempt to
48) reach more isolated civilians;
- 49) 5. Encourages United Nations member states to faithfully
50) support the expelled aid agencies as they make their bids to
51) be re-admitted to the Darfur region.
- 52) 6. Defines the current conflict as an acute case of ethnic and
53) humanitarian crisis;
- 54) 7. Demands the reentry of the 13 NGOs kicked out by the
55) Khartoum government;
- 56) 8. Suggests that other NGOs and other aid initiatives not be
57) discouraged or prohibited from entering;
- 58) 9. Requests that these NGOs be accompanied by an Arab
59) League representative;
- 60) 10. Further Requests an investigatory council made up of Arab
61) League sponsored, United Nations approved members;

- 62) 11. Instigates a timeline of NGO reentry allowance for 1 month
63) after adoption.
