Decline in Multilateral Trading

1 THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY,

2 *Knowing* that multilateral trading is any trade transactions or agreements
3 between multiple states,

4 *Understanding* that United Nations encourages multilateral trading as a
5 method of promoting a strong economy,

6 *Having considered* that member states have instituted regulations against
7 this system,

8 *Having considered* that multilateral trade agreements aid in improving the
9 economies of developing countries and the United Nations aims to double
10 the exports of developing countries by year 2030,

11 *Knowing* multilateral trade has long been used to aid in peaceful relations
12 between states and as a method for improving both developed and
13 developing economies,

14 *Conscious* that an attempt to fight multilateral trade agreements member
15 states have attempted to dismantle trade agreements and raise tariffs,

16 *Knowing* that multilateral trade agreements, despite their many benefits,
17 face two major problems,

18 *Firstly*, states involved in multilateral trade agreements face a competitive
19 power struggle including conflict and change in powers that makes
20 cooperation between states more difficult,

21 *Having considered* that difficulty in cooperation causes states to make trade
22 deals with very little value,

23 Understanding that redistribution of global powers also makes these trade
24 agreements very complicates,

25 *Knowing* that secondly multilateral trading agreements face difficulty when
26 states attempt to implement them,

27 *Recalling* that there is worry that many states will reap the benefits of trade
28 deals without holding up their end of the bargain,

29 *Observing* that there are few regulations which underline how to ensure that
30 states actually take action on the deals they have agreed to,

31 *Having considered* that the United Nations has, in the past, aimed to
32 promote multilateral trading however they have not taken any concrete
33 steps.

- 34 1. Having considered the issues outlined in the above clause I propose
35 the following solution;
- 36 2. Knowing that the main reason which multilateral trade agreements fail
37 is due to lack of trust between member states the United Nations
38 needs to take action to support these agreements;
- 39 3. Having understood that most previous action taken by the United
40 Nations has not included concrete steps, this resolution supports
41 concrete intervention of the United Nations into agreements made by
42 member states;
- 43 4. Understanding that member states lack guidance in making the
44 agreement, the resolution must include a clause which enforces that
45 the United Nations is in charge of all multilateral trade agreements
46 between member states so that the United Nations can act as a
47 separate entity to control the multilateral trade agreements of member
48 states;
- 49 5. Knowing that the only way for the United Nations to effectively take on
50 this authority is to implement punishment on countries who do not
51 hold up their side of the deal, this resolution includes a clause to give
52 the United Nations that authority.
