Topic: Synthetic Drug Trafficking

Proposed by: France, Philippines and Venezuela

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY,

Reminding that the UN toolkit was established to help the slow of synthetic drug production, and has been released in a French version,

Alarmed By the amount of different substances that have been created for numerous people to obtain illegally,

Stressing the fact that many people have been able to access these illegal synthetic drugs through social media and the deep web,

Emphasizing that more laboratories are popping up across Europe and other continents, and are becoming harder to bust because of increased security,

1. Calls for an International task force trained by the UN to stop the spread of synthetic drugs through borders and other access points;
 - a. Specific measures will be taken such as militarizing countries and increasing security on land border crossings as well as water-ways;
2. Encourages a focus on humanitarian aid services that provide education, aid, and support to regions struggling with drug-centric infrastructure and economies:
 - a. Provides education for the country that the operation is taking place in for how to handle themselves and their country after the disestablishment of the drug cartels and the drug trafficking rings:

3. Requesting the establishment of a Drug Defense Force (DDF) for each country that focuses on the apprehension of known drug hot spots:
 - a. The DDF would be a multinational coalition of intelligence agencies cooperating together to tackle synthetic drug trafficking,
 - b. The DDF will work in tandem with the International task force to ensure the protection of the civilian population within the countries where the military operations are taking place;
4. Respecting countries sovereignty by requesting access before a UN task force enters:
 - a. If a country is being accused by a $\frac{2}{3}$ majority of aiding synthetic drug trafficking groups, they can be held accountable in trial by the UN/ICC;
5. Demanding that permanent security council members pay 70% of the total cost of operational spending, while the other UN countries account for the other 30% of the cost:
 - a. If needed, countries can request for financial assistance.
